SPECIAL NOTE TO ALL PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS

Time allocations for paper presentations should be strictly observed. A code for the number of minutes allotted for each symposium, panel, workshop, or single paper is given in **brackets** at the head of each period (whether plenary or concurrent). This code indicates the amount of time reserved for each presentation **in the order of presentation**. Thus "Concurrent Papers [30 min/10 min]" means that the Speaker has 30 minutes and the Commentator 10 minutes. Moderators should observe time limitations and be especially careful to conclude the sessions on time.

PUBLICATION NOTICE TO 1985 PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS

All papers presented at the SPEP annual meetings shall be made available to the Executive Co-Directors for first consideration for publication. Papers presented in the 1984 to 1987 series will be reviewed for possible inclusion in the next two volumes (numbers XII and XIII to be edited by Professors Silverman and Welton.) Symposium, panel, workshop and single papers should be submitted to the SPEP Co-Directors **in duplicate** within a month following the conference at which they were presented. Commentaries and current book discussions will normally not be included. Typically, major symposium and panel sessions will be published. All papers accepted or invited for presentation at SPEP meetings **should not be submitted elsewhere for publication** without official notification that the paper will **not** be included in one of the SPEP volumes. The Co-Directors will attempt to notify program participants as soon as possible concerning the disposition of their papers. Although participants must observe strictly the time limitations when presenting papers at the SPEP conferences, submitted essays may be expanded. They should not, however, exceed 20 pages in typescript.

MINUTES OF THE 1984 SOCIETY FOR PHENOMENOLOGY AND EXISTENTIAL PHILOSOPHY BUSINESS MEETING

The following items were decided during the 1984 Society for Phenomenology and Existential Philosophy business meeting:

1. The membership decided to raise annual dues to \$15.00. Dues for students will remain at \$5.00.
2. The invitation from the University of Notre Dame to hold the 1987 Society for Phenomenology and Existential Philosophy meetings on their campus in South Bend, Indiana was gladly accepted by the membership.
3. The outgoing member of the Executive Committee, Professor Harold Alderman, was thanked for his faithful service during the past three years.
4. Professor Arleen B. Dallery was elected to the Executive Committee for a term of three years.
5. A suggestion to give notices of acceptance or rejection of paper proposals was introduced and discussed.
6. A Committee on the Status of Women in the Society for Phenomenology and Existential Philosophy, was formed. This Committee is an ad hoc advisory committee with the following tasks: (a) expand membership of women in the Society for Phenomenology and Existential Philosophy and reach out to former members who no longer attend the meetings; (b) encourage proposals from, and a more active level of participation by, women in the Society; (c) express concern if the final program does not have an adequate level of participation by women; and (d) study any problems concerning the status of women in the Society for Phenomenology and Existential Philosophy and report to the general membership meeting during the 1985 conference.
7. The following people were elected as members of the Committee on the Status of Women in the Society for Phenomenology and Existential Philosophy: Professor Nancy Fraser, Professor Lenore Langsdorf, and Professor William McBride.
