Minutes of the 1990 Business Meeting

The Business Meeting was called to order at 5:55 pm, October 12, 1990 by Arleen Dallery.

1. The minutes of the 1989 meeting at Duquesne University were approved.
2. David Crownfield was appointed parliamentarian.
3. The Society expressed its gratitude to Walter Brogan and Jack Doody of Villanova University for the local arrangements and for the financial support given to SPEP by Villanova for this meeting.
4. The deaths of members Linda Singer and Herbert Spiegelberg were noted and brief eulogies were offered by Bernard Dauenhauer, Claude Evans, and Fred Kersten, in memory of Prof. Spiegelberg; and by Jana Sawicki, Peg Simon and Glenn Mazis, in memory of Prof. Singer.
5. Co-Director Arleen Dallery presented the following statistical information for the membership: Some 125 papers were submitted for this meeting, of which 72 (57.6%) were accepted. Of these, 36 (28.8%) were submitted by women, of which 23 (31.94% of accepted submissions) were accepted. About 400 members are attending the current meeting. Total membership is put at about 1,280. There is about \$16,000.00 in the SPEP treasury.
6. The 1991 meeting will be hosted by Memphis State University at a downtown Memphis hotel. Tom Nenon and Robert Bernasconi are the local co-ordinators.
7. Prof. Tymieniecka notes that there will be a session on phenomenology at the World Congress in Kenya, July, 1991.
8. Elections: Lenore Langsdorf (Southern Illinois University) was elected without opposition to be Co-Director for a term of three years, succeeding Arleen Dallery. Drucilla Cornell (Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law) and Debra Bergoffen (George Mason University) were nominated for the position on the Executive Committee vacated by Lenore Langsdorf. Drucilla Cornell was elected. The Society expressed its thanks to Arleen Dallery for her years of service on the Executive Committee and as Co-Director.
